- A growing number of unchurched people are connecting in relationships through ministry programming.



Gathering in Multiple Contexts

The past year for Worship Arts can be summed up in one word, adaptable. This year saw an increase in volunteer recruiting and training as the AVL department ramped up their volunteer core to 13 or so dedicated people trained to serve in different capacities. We began streaming our entire 9:30 service later in 2019 and that has paid huge dividends as we moved into a total digital platform during the pandemic. We completed our second community musical which has created some incredible relationships that continue to thrive and a few have taken next steps to be more integrated within the OSLC community. Worship Arts has worked seamlessly to provide worship opportunities for Women's Ministry (IF Gathering) Men's Ministry (Men's Retreat), Youth Ministry (Various youth retreats) and Kidmin (VBS and Lutherhaven). We also held our first two "Nights of Worship".

In March of 2020, we shifted our worship services completely online while creatively coming up with new content to engage families intergenerationally through this digital platform. Through all these changes and shifting of focus, Worship Arts has remained grounded in the vision of "Connecting people in worship to help them experience Christ" no matter what that may look like. We have been blessed with some of the most gifted, servant-hearted people at OSLC who together make this all possible. We are excited about the future and what God has in store as we creatively work together to communicate the Gospel and help people experience the love that God has for them whether that is in the same room or miles apart.

Bridging to our Community

- Back to School Fair served 450 kids with school supplies
 and winter coats.
- Faith in Action met each month to repair cars, prepare meals, and employ community action teams. Most of our beneficiaries are low income and/or senior citizens. We saw an increase in the number of members using FIA for personal outreach.
- We raised enough money to sustain 15 babies and their mothers in the Child Survival Program in Nicaragua through pie sales.
- Abundance Garden provided over 750 pounds of fresh produce to the local Nourish Food Bank and forged a new relationship with the Puyallup Tribe.
- Giving Tree supported close to 40 families with extra demands of the holiday season. Most families were recommended by school counselors so we know they live in our neighborhood very local.

- Elder tithes reached close to 27 organizations/ministries with much needed resources. Some examples of recipients include organizations that address homelessness, hunger, youth spiritual development, and missions.
- Backpacks 4 Kids continues to serve 240 kids per week with weekend food bags. These bags go to Pierce County's largest population of ALICE households - Asset Limited Income Constrained Employed (aka: working poor).
- Backpacks 4 Kids added hygiene pantries to all secondary schools and sustained all 5 food pantries.

Outreach

All outreach programs adapted immediately to the COVID epidemic and found new ways to get resources to families in need - non of our resources were underutilized. Some examples include: a displaced family living in a motel, terminally ill mother who lost her job when the epidemic hit, and a mother and son living in their car.

The pandemic strengthened our reach into the community as we were invited onto response teams with the Franklin Pierce School District and Pierce County Hunger Partners.

OSLC has been invited into the Franklin Pierce 2-Generation Collaboration Design Team, a group focused on responding to the most pressing needs of the Franklin Pierce community. As a key partner, we have been invited to serve as thought leaders and champions for our community.



Operations


